

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



A program to show glowing respect to Amar Ekushey and International Mother Language Day was celebrated at NDUB campus at 7:30 a.m. on 21 February 2017, which was attended by all levels of people of the university. At the beginning, one minute silence was observed in honor of the language martyrs who laid down their lives on 21 February 1952. Then with the chanting of the national anthem Fr. Benjamin Costa, CSC, VC-in-charge and Fr. Adam S.Periera, Registrar hoisted the national flag at half-mast. They placed floral wreaths at the makeshift monument and stood in solemn silence for some time as a mark of homage to the memories of the language heroes. The teachers and students also placed bouquet there.

Fr. Benjamin in his speech narrated, "Pakistan having mainly two parts as West Pakistan and East Pakistan (current Bangladesh) gained independence from Great Britain on 14 August 1947. On this day in 1952 students and people from all walks of life took to the streets in Dhaka to protest the then government's refusal to recognize Bengali as one of the state languages and the unjust imposition of Urdu as the solo official language of Pakistan. Salam, Barkat, Rafiq and a few others lost their lives when the police opened fire indiscriminately on the procession. As a result, the movement in support of Bengali continued across the country. In 1956 the Pakistan government was compelled to incorporate an article in the constitution, which declared that the state languages of the country would be Bengali and Urdu. Finally through a great struggle and bloodshed Bengali was established as an official language of Pakistan."

It is mention-worthy here that 11 Bengalis were killed on 19 May 1961 in police firing at Selchar railway station, Assam, India while demanding state recognition of Bengali language. Their invaluable sacrifice is also remembered with honor.



Fr. Adam mentioned with satisfaction that Bengalis living in different parts of the globe celebrate the event with due dignity. Mr. Jamilur Rahman Khan (faculty member) explained the background and history of Amar Ekkushey in a nutshell and added that the language-based massive protest progressed into the national struggle that led to the emergence of Bangladesh. So the movement to preserve the honor of Bengali is an immense source of pride and inspiration for all Bengalis as we celebrate great Ekushe (21 February). Mr. Tahsin Ahmed Shams (another member of faculty) recited a poem enriched with the spirit of language movement. A student also recited a patriotic poem and another student presented a song. Fr. Adam expressed his gratitude to the faculty, office staff and students for arranging the program befitting the occasion. He thanked all for attending the celebration which was nicely conducted by Josephine Benedicta Gomes, a student of NDUB.

On 10 March 2017 NDUB student Education Tour cum Picnic was arranged at Nuhash Palli, Gazipur (founded by renowned litterateur Humayun Ahmed) about 50 kilometers north of Dhaka Metropolis. It is a park having some facilities for a picnic or excursion. A contingent of 850 people including 700 students of all departments, administrative officers, and faculty and office staff started off at 8:00 a.m. for the destination by 19 buses and 2 university vehicles. The entourage included VC, Treasurer, Registrar and some members of the faculty. Breakfast was served to all on the buses during the journey. There was a bit of traffic jam on the way, so the transports carrying the picnickers reached the destination at 11:00 am. The beauty of the author's memory is enmeshed at Nuhash Palli and enchanted everybody. The students closely observed the green vegetation with different types of trees, medicinal plants and flowers. Humayun Ahmed was an adorer of nature. There are some splendid statues at the entrance point, birds in the long cage and lotus and water lily in bloom inside the ditch. Some huts on the high trees remind the visitors of the famous movie titled Tarzan. A brick-built house stained with mud is located at the mid-eastern side of the park. The rooms are furnished with some beds, chairs and tables. In the northern part a pond along with a mermaid named Lilabati and a mound creates illusive atmosphere. There is a small rest house with a balcony stretching out to the pond. The place also displays a sculpture of Humayun Ahmed and some stone-statues of animals of the pre-historic age. A chess board of concrete structure with wooden chessmen is a special attraction to those who are fond of the game of chess. In the south-western corner of the park the popular novelist and dramatist Humayun sleeps in his tomb receiving shade from some litchi trees encircled by a wire fence.

The students were divided into a number of groups. They visited every nook and corner, took lots of pictures, heartily enjoyed themselves and became a little tired and hungry.

A delicious lunch appeased their hunger and they became lively again. There was a makeshift stage on which a cultural program consisting of song, dance, recitation and acting was arranged with the participation of the picnickers.





There was also a raffle draw through which some lucky students got several prizes.

Fr. Edmond, Convener, Picnic Committee, Fr. Adam, Registrar and Fr. Benjamin, VC-in-charge praised the students for taking part in the picnic and remaining disciplined all along. The VC-in-charge asked the participants to prepare reflective write-ups on the experience gained during the picnic at Nuhash Palli and declared that Tk. 10,000/ would be given as prize money.

The picnic at Nuhash Palli was an event the students dreamt about. The picnickers enjoyed themselves thoroughly during the daylong program.

All of them boarded the buses which started for Dhaka at 6:45 p.m. and reached NDUB campus between 10:00 and 11:15 p.m. The memory of this picnic is expected to remain fresh in their minds for a long time.

In accordance with the VC's instruction 19 students submitted their write-ups regarding the picnic to VC Office in the stipulated time. Their write-ups disclosed elaborately how they enjoyed the trip together.

A three-member team looked over their scripts with care. Priyonka Deb Nath (Economics, 1st Batch), Murad Ahmed Khan (English, 3rd Batch) and Elizabeth Eti Marandy (English, 5th Batch) became first, second and third and were a rewarded Tk. 5,000/, 3,000/ and 2,000/ respectively. The recipients of prize money expressed satisfaction for giving them an opportunity to prove their creative abilities through the initiative. Other participants also were happy to participate in the competition. They are grateful to the NDUB authority for arranging the picnic at such a wonderful venue.



CELEBRATION OF INDEPENDENCE DAY & Birth Anniversary of Father of the Nation at NDUB

Bangladesh achieved independence at the cost of three million people's lives and immense sacrifice of numerous families in 1971 from the yoke of Pakistani colonial rule through a nine-month long bloody war under the dynamic leadership of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujubur Rahaman. Following political uncertainty at the dead of night on March 25, 1971 Bangabandhu was arrested and the Pakistan armed forces carried out one of the cruelest massacres in the world history titled "Operation Searchlight" killing numerous innocent people. Then Bangladesh Government in exile was formed and Bengali armed forces and patriotic citizens began resisting the heavily equipped attackers. The cruel forces continued to perpetrate genocide and destroy the citizens' lives and property till they lost their capacity to carry on misdeeds and crimes against humanity. Finally the occupation forces were compelled to surrender on December 16, 1971 and Bangladesh became a sovereign country. Celebrations of Independence Day and Birth Anniversary of Bangabandhu are two important phenomena in the national life of the citizens.



Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahaman topay tribute to this great leader who throughout life worked tirelessly to achieve the independence of Bangladesh defying all sorts of conspiracy. The VC-in-charge in his speech mentioned, "Had Bangabaddhu not been born, Bangladesh would not have emerged. Since 1996 Bangabaddhu's Birthday '17 March' hasbeen celebrated as 'Child Day. We know children are the future of the country. Therefore, all parents and teachers must teach the tender-aged humans to become honest,





patriotic, responsible and non-communal citizens." Ms. Nafisa Sultana and Dr. Jamir Hossain (faculty members) explained the background and history of the liberation struggle led by Bangabandhu. They inspired the students to study the country's history, follow the ideals of Bangabandhu and other national leaders and learn from their examples.

Ms. Rasheda K. Choudhury in her speech stated, "Bangabandhu fully understood the negative attitudes of the then leaders of Pakistan Government towards the Bengali people. So he strategically prepared the nation to face the enemy's brutal armed forces that cracked down on us in a cowardly manner. Many citizens fled to India to save lives. There was huge bloodshed; millions of people were killed, tortured and two hundred thousand girls and women were violated during the liberation war of Bangladesh."

The Chief Guest advised the students to know the authentic history of the country and to realize the sacrifice made by the national leaders, freedom fighters and toiling masses. She motivated them to be profoundly respectful to those who laid down their lives to achieve the independence of our beloved motherland. Finally some students recited poems, presented songs and dances befitting the occasion. At the end the Registrar extended thanks to the Chief Guest and others for taking part in the program.







THE NEW SECOND FLOOR CLASSROOMS Add Space and Luster

The bright central courtyard of the building that houses Notre Dame University Bangladesh has undergone a dramatic transformation. Immediately following the end of final exams in December 2016, workmen of the M/s Mamun Enterprises, a Dhaka construction firm, moved in to carry out the first stage of an expansion project which they completed on schedule at the end of March. What began with the removal of the tile floor and then excavations in order to install new foundation columns has now ended with the addition of four handsome new classrooms above the central courtyard connected by a half-landing staircase at the southwest corner.

These facilities were needed for two reasons. First, in view of the eventual ground breaking for the high-rise campus building being designed by architects at the Bangladesh University of Engineering and Technology, the space currently occupied by NDUB's power station had to be relocated. The transformers and large motor generators will soon occupy what is now the library while the library has been shifted to the two adjacent classrooms. But secondly, in addition to replacing these two lost classrooms, this addition of two new classrooms reckons with a growing number of students.

As with the rest of the current provisional building, the design and the materials used in the construction were chosen with an emphasis on ecological considerations. Solar panels, for instance, line the roof just outside these classrooms and the heavy steel girders which form the skeleton of the structure have been installed in a manner that will allow them to be recovered and used again when the present edifice is dismantled.

The Temporary Facilities Extension Committee oversaw this project and worked to minimize the distraction and disruption while classes and other activities of NDUB were going on. It was led by Fr. Edmond Cruze, CSC, assisted by Fr. Hubert Palma, CSC, Sr. Shagorica Gomes, CSC, and Fr. Joseph Peixotto, CSC, all under the guidance of the Vice Chancellor-in-charge, Fr. Benjamin Costa, CSC.

Off-Campus Activities of NDUB VC-in-charge Annual Sports and Prize Giving Ceremony at Basundhara Grammar School and College

The month-long fair is visited by numerous men, women, youngsters and children from all walks of life. They buy books of their choice. Many parents and guardians present chosen books to their wards.

In the Ekushe Book fair at 4:00 p.m. on February 23, 2017 the wrapper of Fr. Benjamin's book titled Probandasamagra published by Lekha-Prokash was unveiled by culture and media personality and renowned journalist Mr. Kamal Lohani. The write-ups reflect Fr. Benjamin's thoughts regarding human formation, contemporary social issues and amicable solutions to a number of problems the present generations usually come across. - 1. Common for students of Graduate and Undergraduate Programs
- a) Waiver based on results:
 - i) 50% tuition fee waiver for MBA, BBA, & CSE: 4:00 out of 4:00, English & Economics: 3:80 and above; Law: 3:60 and above
 - ii) 40% tuition fee waiver for MBA, BBA & CSE: 3:95 to 3:99; English & Economics: 3:75 to 3:79, Law: 3:55 to 3:59
 - iii) 30% tuition fee waiver for MBA, BBA & CSE: 3:90 to 3:94; English & Economics: 3:70 to 3:74, Law: 3:50-3:54
- b) Up to 50% to the physically challenged candidates;
- c) Up to 20% to spouse, offspring(s) and sibling(s) of the NDUB faculty members and employees;
- d) Up to 20% tuition fee waiver to the children of the freedom fighter;
- 2. Besides the above waivers, special tuition fee waivers may be granted to only the graduate students:
- e) 10% tuition fee waiver will be granted to graduate students coming from missionary colleges and who have financial difficulty;
- f) Up to 25% tuition fee waiver for all of a corporate group of at least 3 candidates;
- g) Up to 100% tuition fee waiver can be granted to one of the three siblings;
- h) Up to 25% tuition fee waiver for one of a married couple
